

They're the Calendar Girls of Guernsey - but there's no nudity in the Pink Ladies' 2006 fundraiser. Instead these models all have one thing in common: they've suffered breast cancer. Zoe Ash found out more.

REMEMBER, happiness doesn't depend upon Who you are or what you have; it depends solely upon what you think,' reads the quote under a photograph of Sarah Minty. In it, it's obvious that she can barely contain herself with excitement.

Sarah is sitting in a bright red sports car. A car that had, only hours before, been commandeered from a man outside a hotel. Sarah is one of the breast cancer sufferers featured in a fundraising calendar launched by the Pink Ladies support group. It was the idea of clinical nurse specialist for the Breast Screening Unit Karen Leach, who's been involved with Pink Ladies since its foundation in 2001 and came hard on the heels of the WI version featuring nude members of a

Yorkshire group - though there were never plans to go quite as far as that. Once the seeds had been sown, Karen wouldn't let go. She kept dropping it into conversation until she roped in her friend, Steve Richards.

New Zealander Steve, 50, has worked as a commercial photographer for 24 years, including a stint on National Geographic magazine, but it was through personal

connections with the Breast Screening Unit that he found himself donating his time, talent and enthusiasm to the calendar. He met the group in February and discovered that it wasn't difficult to get the calendar girls involved: in fact, they volunteered. A list of models was drawn up and thought given to locations and groupings. Some had ideas as to how they'd like to appear, while others wanted to be photographed with certain people but were unsure of the location. Pink Ladies founder Jo Alien was photographed with her dog and former badminton champion Sally Wood was keen to ride her horse on Vazon beach. Midwife Heather Phillips chose to be pictured at work and Jane Tee with net son out on the open seas, while Linda Falla was photographed with her

daughters on the beach. Nancy Gollard, Heather West and Esme Bishop were keen to be pictured together and the time coincided with the Seafood Festival in St Peter Port, so they headed down there. Their photograph, like all the

others, has a very relaxed feel, and that has a lot to do with the style of Steve's photography. 'You have to be confident with people, to keep them relaxed. I don't have to focus on the technicalities any more,' he explained. It was the same with the group for February: Vicky McRitchie, Dianne Scantlebury, Izzy Duckworth and Linda Falla. 'They started strolling across the clifftops and giggling, and then they went right to the edge,' said Steve. Just as in many of the shots, what had actually been planned often veered down another path when shooting started. Annie Woodington, an all-year-round swimmer, is pictured in the familiarity of the Bathing Pools, where what started out as an action shot ended up quite differently.
